## Student-Alum in the Spotlight

Talea Mayo recently received notification that she had earned a perfect score of 800 on the mathematics portion of the Graduate Record Examination. The GRE is the test that is required by most schools for acceptance into graduate programs.

During this same time, she received a communication from Harvard University informing her of the fact that she had been admitted to their School of Engineering and Applied Sciences' Ph. D. program.

Talea was born in Colorado Springs and attended high school in Highlands Ranch, Colorado. She was introduced to Grambling State University at a young age when her mother pointed out the Grambling State University Marching Band. She chose to attend Grambling State University as a result of its strength in academic programs, its location, and its full scholarship award.

She began her studies during the fall of 2004 as a criminal justice major. Talea's love for mathematics resulted in her enrolling in a Calculus III course during her first semester, even though this course was not required in her then major. Dr. Sharma, teacher for the class, quickly noticed this freshman in a class of juniors and seniors. She had a passion for mathematics and exceptional abilities. Dr. Sharma soon convinced Talea to

change her major to mathematics.

As a mathematics major, Talea continues to consistently distinguish herself. She currently has a 3.97 grade point average, maintaining this average while being a member of the Tiger Marching Band, a member of the Concert Band, and a member of the Minority Access for Research Careers (MARC) program.

Talea has participated in three summer internships. She made an effort to choose internships that would broaden her exposure to mathematics being applied to different areas of science. One of the internships allowed her to use mathematics to study genetic networks. Another internship had an atmospheric science research focus, and the third had a planetary science focus. These summer experiences assisted her in determining the graduate program she wants to pursue.



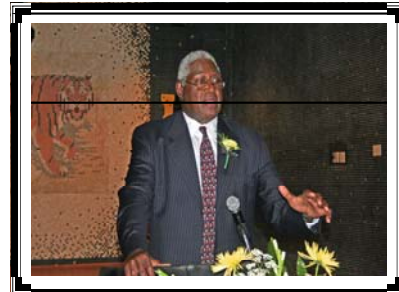

## Alumni Office Participates in Gradfest

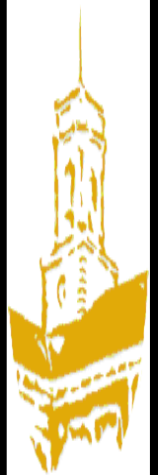
